### The 39<sup>th</sup> Founding Anniversary of CIRDAP

CIRDAP, a Centre of Excellence in Integrated Rural Development, celebrated its 39<sup>th</sup> founding anniversary during 18-19 July at its Secretariat located in Dhaka, Bangladesh. H.E. Mr. Md. Mashiur Rahman Ranga, M.P, hon'ble State Minister for Local Government, Rural Development and Cooperatives, Government of Bangladesh graced the gala anniversary as Chief Guest, and Mr. S.M. Ghulam Farooque, Secretary, Rural Development and Co-operatives Division (RDCD) and Dr. Dr. Durga Prasad Paudyal, former Director General of CIRDAP, was present as special guests. Mr. Tevita G. Boseiwaqa Taginavulau, Director General of CIRDAP chaired the inaugural session. Dr. Salehuddin Ahmed, IRD Expert of CIRDAP and the Former Governor of Bangladesh Bank, presented the keynote paper on Economic and Social Development of Bangladesh on Rural Development.

The technical sessions includes keynote presentations, panelists' discussions and question-answer episodes. A total of 210 participants were present in the two-day ceremony from different national and international organizations, INGOs, NGOs, including BARD, RDA, BRDB, BAPARD, BARC, KGF, Universities, Foundations, Municipalities, and Embassies/High Commissions of CMCs in Dhaka. The technical sessions were followed by a closing ceremony with the presence of Mr. S.M. Ghulam Farooque, Secretary, RDCD, and a gala tea party in the CIRDAP garden.

### Proposed Research Initiatives of CIRDAP

CIRDAP has initiated the following three proposed research studies to enable the rural communities and improve the living conditions of marginalized rural people:

Title	Country coverage	Short brief of the study
<b>Study on the Smart Village Good Practices/Models in CMCs to Develop a CIRDAP Wise Village Model</b>	CMCs –	CIRDAP intends to establish a Wise Village following the concept of Mahatma Gandhi. The WISE Village will have all the components of Smart Village. In addition it will have perfect sanitation, cottages with sufficient light and ventilation. The village lanes and streets will be free of all avoidable dust. It will have wells according to its needs and accessible to all. It will have houses of worship for all; also a common meeting place, a village common field for grazing its cattle, a co-operative dairy, primary and secondary schools in which industrial education will be the central fact, and it will have local government office for settling disputes. It will produce its own grains, vegetables and fruit, and its own clothing, etc.

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>– The CIRDAP wise village will focus on the cultural and traditions in various aspects of life such as healthy rectify natural food preservation, traditionally used herbs or plants for medicine, preservations and for culinary purposes may be disappearing now a days due to rural communities moving towards modernization. There are several traditions followed in important events like marriage, festivals, deaths etc. can be identified and practiced in proposed wise village. Similarly also disappearing culture of the communities can also be brought to light in the village.</li> </ul>
<b>Livelihood Development of the Most Marginalized Coastal Fishermen</b>	CMCs	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>– Coastal fishermen and their family members may undertake a variety of supplementary occupations concurrently or during the non-fishing season. Some of these occupations are fish processing, farming and labour employment which are referred as non-fishing activities.</li> <li>– CIRDAP would like to initiate a study to improve the living conditions of the coastal fishermen and their family members of CMCs.</li> </ul>
<b>Ecotourism: A Tool for Sustainable Rural Development</b>	CMCs	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>– Flourishing of ecotourism will create social changes as well. It can reduce out migration which is a very alarming issue at present. Another impact of ecotourism in the society will be enhancing living standard of the local people through more income, experience and expenditure. The lifestyle of the local people change as ecotourism develops.</li> <li>– CIRDAP is expected to exploit the possibilities of establishing rural eco-tourism in CMCs in order to uplift the livelihood of rural population. In accordance with this, CIRDAP will carry out a study on the policies of CMCs towards developing eco-tourism, and find out successful models already established. These successful models can be replicated with appropriate modifications to suit the individual countries.</li> </ul>

## Meeting with BARD on Collaborative Pilot Projects

Mr. Arulappu George Chandra Babu (Program Officer-Research) and Mr. Mahmudul Hasan Chowdhury (Executive Assistant-Research) visited the Bangladesh Academy for Rural Development (BARD) on 12th July 2018 to discuss on the implementing of two proposed pilot projects i.e. “Seed Potato Project” and “Multi-Commodity Solar Tunnel Dryer”. Later on, they also visited two CVDP villages of BARD to gather first-hand information on the successful implementation of rural development projects in the villages. BARD officials were willingly agreed to initiate necessary actions to implement the seed potato project.

## Follow up of the Meeting

A team from CIRDAP, comprising of Mr. Mr. George Babu, Ms. Elora Sharmin (Programme Officer-Training) and Md. Zakaria (Project Coordinator), visited BARD on 23 July 2018 to participate in the 59<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of BARD and discuss the collaborative programmes for 2018-19. They also visited a small village namely Dighol Gao near BARD, and discussed with farmers association. They discussed the followings during meeting:

They are searching for resource persons in this regard. We can find out/provide appropriate scientists for half day seminar at BARD while needed.	It can be in this year or next year. BARD can arrange a half day seminar. CIRDAP can provide expert support.

### Supporting Programmes of CIRDAP

- With the support from CIRDAP and other organisations, the Asian Productivity Organization (APO) organized an **International Summit on Sustainable Productivity** in Tokyo, Japan on 10 July 2018. Director General of CIRDAP Mr. Tevita G. Boseiwaqa Taginavulau attended the summit as an observer. The summit was expected to help those attending understand the challenges,



opportunities, and impact of emerging technologies on productivity, industries, and economies in general, and provide opportunities for discussions with technology leaders and experts on future policy interventions needed to adapt successfully to the fast-changing digital world.

- Rajiv Gandhi National Institute for Youth Development (RGNIYD), India in partnership with Commonwealth Youth Programme (CYP), London, UNESCO-MGIEP, India, UNICEF, UNV, ILO, IOM organized a 3-day long International Conference on ***“Achieving Youth Specific-SDGs: Key Challenges and Policy Responses”*** on 25-27 July 2018 at RGNIYD Campus, Sripeumbudur, Tamil Nadu, India. CIRDAP as an official partner engaged in this programme sponsoring two participants from Lao PDR and Sri Lanka. Ms. Bindia Nag, Assistant Programme Officer (Research and Training) also attended this programme as Representative of CIRDAP.

### One Year PGDRDM for 2018-19

For one year Post Graduate Diploma in Rural Development Management (PGDRDM) for 16<sup>th</sup> Batch 2018-19, nominations were sought from CIRDAP Member Countries (CMCs). From six countries, 16 nominations were received. On the basis of prescribed eligibility criteria nominations were scrutinized and primarily selected for interview, and the short-listed candidates were requested for Skype interview. Finally selected candidates will be recommended to MoRD, GoI, and also to NIRD&PR, to admit them in the forthcoming PGDRDM 16<sup>th</sup> batch programme.
