




Theme: Rural Women Cultivating Good Food for All



Gender equality and women empowerment is one of the 17 Sustainable Development Goals, but also integral to all dimensions of inclusive and sustainable development.



Since 1995 Beijing Platform for action of Fourth World Conference on Women, this empowerment concept gets importance by five phases viz. welfare, access, conscientization, participation and control.



Rural women are key agents for development. They play a catalystic role towards achievement of transformational economic, environmental and social changes required for sustainable development. But limited access to credit, health care and education are among the many challenges they face.









At first women needs to organize themselves in a group based organization or individual initiatives as well for empowerment. But rural women are in more vulnerable position to organize themselves in a group.

But, organization activities can solve their social and economic problems as well as other related issues which will lead them to reach the road to empowerment. They can be enlightened by acquiring themselves to the power of self-help, achieving social equality as well as equity and group solidarity.

Rural Women Organizations in Bangladesh

Identifying women as potential leaders and encouraging and supporting them through advanced training, mentoring, and coaching has also been identified as a successful policy. Since organizations are based on values like self help, democracy, equality, equity and solidarity, they can play a strong role in empowering women, especially in developing countries like Bangladesh. Organizations allow women who might have been isolated and working individually to band together and create economic of scale as well as increase their own bargaining power in the market.





Due to gender norms on the traditional role of women, and other instilled cultural practices that sidestep attempted legal protections, women suffer a disproportionately low representation in organization membership around the world. Representation of women through active membership (showing up to meetings and voting), as well as in leadership and managerial positions is even lower.



From 1972 there are many NGOs are come forward to work with rural women and incorporate them in group base organization involve and them in different development Bangladesh activities in along with government. But still now most of the NGOs are working only credit based activities.




Bangladesh ranked 1st in gender parity among South Asian nations by the World Economic Forum

BARD's Experiments on Rural Women Organizations


Bangladesh Academy for Rural Development (BARD) is working as a catalyst to ensure education and enhance financial capabilities of the rural people in agriculture and business with special emphasis on women irrespective of gender, religion and caste. The need for integrating rural women in development was felt by BARD in early sixties and initiated the Women's experimental projects on development by creating village based organization in its laboratory area.



BARD undertake education and women development activities as given below:

Women's Education, Income and Improvement Nutrition **Project** (WEINIP) was started to improve status and empower females and evolve a replicable model for the development of rural women in Bangladesh. After some modification now WEINIP activities of BARD is comprehensive in nature and follows the consists of sustainable village organization, build capacity with continuing education through horizontal learning and training system provided to the Village based women's societies (VWS) members for the development of the quality of life in the rural areas.





The main objective of the project is to create opportunities for rural women especially among disadvantaged and poor families to participate actively in the mainstream of social and economic development activities and to increase income for their empowerment.
