Digital Agriculture: The future of Agricultural Extension

Across the Asia-Pacific, from the coral reefs of Fiji to the mountains of IR Iran, 4.3 billion rural residents face a critical challenge: by 2050, they need 77% more food to sustain our region, yet climate change threatens a 15-20 % productivity drop, impacting rice fields in Vietnam and fisheries in Indonesia. Digital agriculture is one of the prime solution to this food security crisis.

The region's literacy rate averages 70% in rural areas, with women at 65%, but digital literacy lags at 25% compared to 45% in urban centers, hindering access to transformative tools. With 1.73 billion mobile subscribers (62% of the population) and 50% mobile internet penetration, the Asia-Pacific is poised for change. Digital tools like IoT, sensor networks, data security, and public-private partnerships have the potential to connect every village in the region.




In Indonesia's Sulawesi, Aruna's platform links Konawa fishers to global markets, boosting incomes by 15% with real-time pricing. In Bangladesh's Cox's Bazar, Kalu Fakir Para farmers use ICT apps and Farmer Field Schools, slashing rice production costs by 20%. The Philippines' Bicol Region adopts Farmmonaut for precision irrigation against typhoons. Vietnam's Ha Tinh province leverages the "Lang So" e-handbook, integrating 30 local digital platforms. Myanmar's Mandalay classrooms thrive with UNESCO's ICT training for teachers, while Iran's Khorasan villages market handicrafts via the Transaction Services Model. Thailand's Lampang Mae Moh doubles incomes with EGAT-supported vertical farming, and China's Guizhou lifts 70 million from poverty through e-commerce hubs since 2013.

CIRDAP calls for mandatory digital adoption by extension workers, literacy campaigns from Fiji's coral shores to Nepal's Himalayas, and mobilizing local networks like Indonesia's KUDs or Sri Lanka's Samurdhi groups. Expand connectivity, forge cross-border partnerships, and tackle regulatory barriers. Let's ensure every Pacific Islander, Southeast Asian farmer, and Central Asian herder thrives in a sustainable, inclusive digital future.



Building Resilient Communities through Innovation: The Community-Based Integrated Rural Development Centre (CBIRD) in Sub Tai, Thailand 🐬

A Model of Integrated Rural Development and Conservation from Thailand

In the rural heartland of northeastern Thailand, the Community-Based Integrated Rural Development Centre (CBIRD) in Sub Tai village stands as a remarkable example of how integrated approaches can uplift communities while preserving the environment. Established in 1985 by the Population and Community Development Association (PDA), CBIRD Sub Tai has become a pioneering model that links biodiversity conservation with sustainable livelihoods.

Located near the ecologically rich Khao Yai National Park, the community once faced intense socioeconomic pressures—including poverty, high indebtedness, and environmental degradation driven by illegal logging and poaching. In response, CBIRD Sub Tai developed a holistic strategy to reverse this trend by aligning conservation efforts with tangible economic incentives for local residents.



Key innovations such as the Environmental Protection Society

(EPS)—a self-help group offering low-interest loans in exchange for conservation commitments—and the Carbon Bank model, where villagers were financially rewarded for reforestation, have transformed the local landscape. Capacity building in organic farming, youth and women's training programs, and investments in ecotourism and small businesses have ensured long-term community engagement and financial sustainability.

The impacts speak volumes: illegal logging and poaching decreased by over 75%, forest areas have been regenerated, and village incomes nearly doubled within four years of project implementation. Notably, the initiative now generates over 70% of its annual operating budget through local commercial ventures, proving its sustainability and scalability.

Having been replicated in over 150 villages across Thailand, the CBIRD Sub Tai model offers a practical, community-driven framework that supports both rural prosperity and ecological integrity. As countries strive to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), this model provides a valuable template for integrated rural development around the world.

CIRDAP and the GIAN (Gujarat Grassroots Innovation Augmentation Network) signed MoU: Strengthening Grassroots Innovation for Inclusive Rural Development

On 18 June 2025, CIRDAP and the Gujarat Grassroots Innovation Augmentation Network (GIAN) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to empower rural communities, promote innovation-driven enterprises, and foster cross-border knowledge exchange across the Asia-Pacific.





The MoU was signed by FAM Zakirul Huq, Head of Administration, CIRDAP, and Dr. Anamika Dey, CEO, GIAN, in the presence of HE. Dr. P Chandra Shekara, Director General, CIRDAP, and Prof. Anil K. Gupta, Founder of GIAN and faculty at NIRDPR, along with PGD-RDM students and distinguished representatives from CIRDAP member countries. In his keynote address, Prof. Gupta emphasized the urgency of giving "voice, visibility, and velocity" to grassroots innovations for inclusive and sustainable rural development.

"Harnessing Creativity and Open Innovations for Inclusive Rural Development" — This was the inspiring message shared by Prof. Anil Gupta, Founder of the Honey Bee Network and GIAN, during the CIRDAP–NIRDPR International Training Programme on 18 June 2025. In this powerful session, he emphasized that frugal, grassroots innovations can emerge not from material scarcity, but from empathetic immersion in others' pain — a spirit embodied in initiatives like Shodhyatra and Salisilk Lakbay. Prof. Gupta called for a strong ecosystem linking farmers, artisans, scientists, students, and policymakers to create accessible, circular, and sustainable solutions. With the Honey Bee Network offering voice, visibility, and velocity to informal innovators, he underscored the need for a collaborative future through the proposed Academy of Inclusive Innovations and Knowledge Augmentation (AIIKA). This interaction marks a key step in CIRDAP-GIAN's vision to transform rural development from policy to practice.

CIRDAP - Voice of Rural Communities

The Centre on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the Pacific (CIRDAP) is an Intergovernmental, Regional, and Autonomous organization. It was established on 6 July 1979 at the initiative of the countries of the Asia-Pacific region and the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations with support from several other UN bodies and donors. The Centre came into being to meet the felt needs of the developing countries at that time as an institution for promoting Integrated Rural Development in the region.

The United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) declared the date of 6 July as the World Rural Development Day, which is also the foundation day of Centre on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the pacific (CIRDAP), as a recognition of the organizations significant role in sustainable rural development endeavors in its member states in the Asia-Pacific region. The World Rural Development Day will be celebrated every 6 July as to inform and to remind everyone on his/her role and responsibility for collaborative actions on integrated rural development to meet the Sustainable Development Goals.

From the original six members, CIRDAP has now grown up as a Centre of 15 member countries. The member-countries are Afghanistan, Bangladesh (Host Country), Fiji, India, Indonesia, IR Iran, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, Nepal, Pakistan, Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Vietnam.

The main objectives of CIRDAP are to:

- Assist National Action;
- Promote Regional Cooperation;
- and Act as a servicing institution for its member countries for promotion: Integrated Rural Development (IRD) through Research, Action Research, Pilot Project, Training, and Information Dissemination. Amelioration of Rural Poverty in the Asia-Pacific region has been the prime concern of CIRDAP.

The programme priorities of CIRDAP are set under four Areas of Concern:

- Agrarian Development;
- Institutional/Infrastructural;
- Resource development, including human resources;
- and Employment.

Within these Areas of Concern, the thematic areas identified are: Poverty alleviation through participatory approaches with emphasis on social sector development (e.g. Health, Education and Nutrition); Employment generation through Microcredit support, Infrastructure Development and Local resource mobilisation; Gender issues; Governance issues; and Environmental concerns for Sustainable Rural Development.

Operating through designated Contact Ministries and Link Institutions in member countries, CIRDAP promotes Technical Cooperation among nations of the region. It plays a supplementary and reinforcing role in supporting and furthering the effectiveness of Integrated Rural Development Programmes in the Asia-Pacific region.
