#### **RURAL WOMEN, CIRDAP, AND THE ROAD TO EMPOWERMENT**

CIRDAP celebrated International Rural Women Day on 15<sup>th</sup> October in presence of 14 inspiring women from member countries namely Sri Lanka, Myanmar, India, Bangladesh, Pakistan, Iran and Nepal. It was indeed an opportunity to recognize and honor the dedicated rural women and to inspire the rest through their success stories. Manjulika Chakma who established Bain Textiles during 1965 to empower rural Tribal women in Bangladesh led the memorable program.

The International Day of Rural Women stands as a beacon, reminding we all that rural women are the primary engine of food security and local economies. Yet, their potential remains constrained by deep-seated socioeconomic



challenges that impede our collective progress toward the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Despite their immense contributions, the status of rural women in the Asia-Pacific is one of significant disparity. The challenges they face are not merely economical; they are structural, hitting them hardest in critical areas. Economic Invisibility and Exclusion due to unpaid and informal labor, lacking equal rights to landownership or the necessary collateral to secure formal credit adds to the grim situation. This economic constraint is amplified by a significant digital gender divide, with digital literacy often lagging, preventing access to modern market information and financial technology.

As primary custodians of natural resources, rural women are on the front lines of the climate crisis, suffering food stress leading directly to higher rates of household malnutrition and poverty. On the other hand, Policy Marginalization is rendering key development programs ineffective at the grassroots level.


To address these barriers, CIRDAP actively promotes, Research, Training, Webinars and exchanges successful grassroots innovations across its member network. CIRDAP research program on sensitizing the stakeholders on Gender Responsive Budgeting in Nepal in Collaboration with Local Development Training Academy generated valuable impact and lessons. ### Call for CIRDAP Research Proposals 2026: Towards Vibrant, Prosperous and Happy Rural Communities

CIRDAP is pleased to announce a Call for Proposals for Research Projects 2026 under the theme "Towards Vibrant, Prosperous and Happy Rural Communities." This initiative reaffirms CIRDAP's commitment to promoting inclusive and sustainable rural development through evidence-based research and knowledge sharing.

The call invites innovative and policy-relevant proposals from CIRDAP Experts, MoU Partners, Link Institutions, Academic and Research Organizations, Civil Society Groups, and Government Agencies across CIRDAP Member Countries. Priority areas include Community-driven development, Rural entrepreneurship, Youth engagement, Gender empowerment, Climate resilience, and innovations in rural service delivery.

Two projects will be selected for 2026, each receiving USD 6,000 in financial support along with technical guidance from the CIRDAP Secretariat. The research should be completed within one year, culminating in a publishable report or case study to enrich regional policy dialogue.

# CIRDAP Signs MoU with SEARCA to Advance Education, Research, and Rural Development in Asia-Pacific



representatives from CIRDAP Member Countries. 🏾



## Empowering Rural Prosperity through the Nepal Agricultural Market Development Programme (Sahaj)

The Nepal Agricultural Market Development Programme, locally known as Sahaj, is transforming the agricultural landscape of rural Nepal through an inclusive and market-driven approach. Implemented under a bilateral agreement between the Government of Nepal and the Government of Switzerland, this initiative is financed by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) and jointly implemented by Swisscontact and the Center for Environmental and Agricultural Policy Research, Extension and Development (CEAPRED).

Sahaj envisions a vibrant and inclusive agriculture sector that creates sustainable employment and income opportunities for rural communities. Its first phase, implemented from March 2016 to

November 2020, successfully integrated smallholder farmers into commercial markets by strengthening agricultural input systems, enhancing productivity, and facilitating better market access. The programme partnered with over seventy-five private sector and ten public sector institutions through fifty targeted interventions across more than fifty districts. As a result, it generated eighteen hundred new jobs and raised the farm incomes of forty-five thousand eight hundred rural households, including women and disadvantaged groups.

Building on these achievements, Phase Two (December 2020 to November 2024) focuses on promoting investment and innovation in agriculture value chains. It aims to enhance forward market



linkages, strengthen agro-processing, and boost the export potential of value-added products in Province Number One. Sahaj's core philosophy, "Partner in innovations for agriculture," guides this phase as it promotes sustainable growth through collaboration between small and medium-sized enterprises, local governments, and the private sector. The programme emphasizes three key pillars—agriculture services, non-agriculture services, and the enabling business environment—to address barriers to growth and foster resilient rural economies.

The expected outcomes of Sahaj Phase Two are remarkable: the creation of one thousand new jobs in the local economy, forty percent of which will be for women and twenty percent for disadvantaged groups, generating an annual income of Nepalese Rupees one hundred and fifty million. Additionally, twenty thousand farmers, including six thousand women and five thousand from disadvantaged backgrounds, will benefit from an annual increase of Nepalese Rupees three hundred million in farm income.

Through innovation, inclusive partnerships, and a strong focus on value addition, Sahaj continues to contribute significantly to integrated rural development in Nepal, empowering communities and creating a resilient, market-oriented agricultural economy.

#### **CIRDAP - Voice of Rural Communities**

The Centre on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the Pacific (CIRDAP) is an Intergovernmental, Regional, and Autonomous organization. It was established on 6 July 1979 at the initiative of the countries of the Asia-Pacific region and the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations with support from several other UN bodies and donors. The Centre came into being to meet the felt needs of the developing countries at that time as an institution for promoting Integrated Rural Development in the region.

The United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) declared the date of 6 July as the World Rural Development Day, which is also the foundation day of Centre on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the pacific (CIRDAP), as a recognition of the organizations significant role in sustainable rural development endeavors in its member states in the Asia-Pacific region. The World Rural Development Day will be celebrated every 6 July as to inform and to remind everyone on his/her role and responsibility for collaborative actions on integrated rural development to meet the Sustainable Development Goals.

From the original six members, CIRDAP has now grown up as a Centre of 15 member countries. The member-countries are Afghanistan, Bangladesh (Host Country), Fiji, India, Indonesia, IR Iran, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, Nepal, Pakistan, Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Vietnam.

#### The main objectives of CIRDAP are to:

- Assist National Action;
- Promote Regional Cooperation;
- and Act as a servicing institution for its member countries for promotion: Integrated Rural Development (IRD) through Research, Action Research, Pilot Project, Training, and Information Dissemination. Amelioration of Rural Poverty in the Asia-Pacific region has been the prime concern of CIRDAP.

#### The programme priorities of CIRDAP are set under four Areas of Concern:

- Agrarian Development;
- Institutional/Infrastructural;
- Resource development, including human resources;
- Employment.

Within these Areas of Concern, the thematic areas identified are: Poverty alleviation through participatory approaches with emphasis on social sector development (e.g. Health, Education and Nutrition); Employment generation through Microcredit support, Infrastructure Development and Local resource mobilisation; Gender issues; Governance issues; and Environmental concerns for Sustainable Rural Development.

Operating through designated Contact Ministries and Link Institutions in member countries, CIRDAP promotes Technical Cooperation among nations of the region. It plays a supplementary and reinforcing role in supporting and furthering the effectiveness of Integrated Rural Development Programmes in the Asia-Pacific region.
