Asia and Pacific Region have a population of 4.8 billion out of which more than half live in rural areas. One out of seven on an average in the region belongs to disabled category and around 70 percent of Disabled categories such as physical, sensory, intellectual and behavioral living in rural areas. Holistic rural development is incomplete without the empowerment of disabled section in rural communities.

How to achieve inclusive development? Maintaining updated Disability Data along with degree of disability and geo location is very critical for this mission. Sharing this database with all the stakeholders regularly and using appropriately is needed for the time.

Mainstreaming the mission of 'Disability to Ability' in all ministries, developmental programs and customizing the provisions of the respective ministries to link with Disability Information System will be the major step to take advantage of all public programs for the benefit of Disabled youths. Accommodating flexibility and establishing the operational linkage with active NGOs needs institutionalization.



Establishment of Disability to Ability Incubation centers in NGOs is important to pilot test new ideas, Livelihood opportunities need special considerations. We need to create success stories and path which would assist easy upscaling at national level with much ease effectively by all stakeholders

Special frequent campaigns to sensitize the society about Disability and to transform sympathy to empathy is required. Society led Disability management efforts are more sustainable by involving family, relatives, Neighborhood and institutions. Social media can enhance effectiveness. Present generation is more empathetic to disability but needs constant sensitization and mechanism to involve them in management of disabled population. We need triggers





The Centre on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the Pacific (CIRDAP) is pleased to announce the renewal of its Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the International Land Coalition Asia (ILC Asia) on 13 November 2025.



ILC Asia, established in 2003 and headquartered in Rome, Italy, is the regional platform of the International Land Coalition—a global alliance of more than 300 organisations committed to people- centered land governance. The regional network comprises 64 civil society organisations across 15 countries, including farmers, Indigenous Peoples, pastoralists, women, and youth. Notably, 24 of these organisations directly represent 14 million people in their respective countries.

Through this renewed collaboration, CIRDAP and ILC Asia will work together to:

- Promote and scale up agrarian reforms, agricultural cooperatives, and farmers' associations to strengthen equitable land tenureship and address climate vulnerabilities across Asia and the Pacific.
- Empower farmers and rural communities through cooperative-based development, knowledge exchange, and capacity-building.
- Jointly implement programmes, training, and workshops in alignment with the International Year for Women Farmers (2026) under the Decade of Family Farmers.
- Enhance information sharing, technical cooperation, and resource exchange to support rural transformation and sustainable livelihoods.



The MoU was signed by FAM Zakirul Huq, Head of Administration, CIRDAP and Anu Verma, Regional Coordinator of ILC Asia. The ceremony was graced by the presence of HE. Dr. P. Chandra Shekara, Director General of CIRDAP and along with officials and representatives from both organizations.

The partnership outlines clear responsibilities for both organisations, emphasizing technical support, training, cooperative development, knowledge sharing, and collaborative fundraising to drive impactful rural development initiatives across the region. Together, CIRDAP and ILC Asia reaffirm their shared commitment to advancing inclusive, sustainable, and resilient rural communities.

CIRDAP successfully concluded its Knowledge Series 46 Webinar on "Scientific Poultry House Management: Taiwan Innovations and Learnings" on 27 November 2025. The distinguished speaker, Dr. Shang-Ho Bruce Yang, Professor and Director of the Graduate Institute and Bio-Industry Management at National Chung Hsing University, Taiwan, presented key findings on how improved henhouse design, enhanced environmental control, and advanced farm management practices can boost productivity, reduce mortality, and strengthen the economic performance of Taiwan's layer industry.



The webinar highlighted the importance of stable and reliable egg supply for national food security, especially in the context of climate change and disease challenges. Participants explored strategies for upgrading farm infrastructure, adopting climate-adaptive practices, and building resilience for a sustainable poultry industry.

The session was chaired by His Excellency Dr. P. Chandra Shekara, Director General of CIRDAP, and attended by experts and participants from CIRDAP Member Countries and Taiwan.

#### 'COCOFRIENDS' from CIRDAP and NIRDPR, India Action Research Project

CIRDAP and NIRDPR, India, are collaborating on an action research project titled "Action Lab for the Inclusion of Transgender and Gender-Variant Youth in Mainstream Livelihood" in India. This Project is an Action Lab for setting up sustainable livelihood models for transgender and gender variant youths, enabling their inclusion in the mainstream. The objectives of the project are to create an action lab that would work in collaboration with several national initiatives and institutions for fighting multidimensional poverty within India's transgender and gender-diverse populations by promoting action-oriented research; develop policy framework; provide technical support to various livelihood initiatives; implement collaborative intervention programs; document best practices, and sharing the knowledge with a wide range of stakeholders in order to bridge the skill, employment, resilient livelihoods and entrepreneurial leadership gaps within the transgender community.



As part of the livelihood interventions of the action research project, three action lab initiatives are planned to be established in India. Four training programmes were organised in various sectors and trained a total of 53 individuals in four different locations. Under Action Lab-1, through the Sahodari Foundation, a three-day training was organised from July 28 to 30, 2025, in Pollachi, District Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu, India, where 11 individual transpersons were trained on Coco-shell crafting. Under Action Lab-2, with the support of PLEQSUS India Foundation, training in mushroom cultivation was conducted in West Bengal, during which 15 individuals were trained. In November 2025, two training programmes, namely Spice Grinding training (for 15 individuals) and Sewing Training with the support of USHA International (also for 15 individuals), were also conducted. Additionally, two other activities focusing on poultry farming (poultry sheds have been installed) and cattle rearing are also in the pipeline.

The transgender group, which was trained under Action Lab-1, acquired the skills to transform discarded coconut shells into beautiful, functional items such as tea cups, wine glasses, snack bowls, and decorative pieces. The group has commenced its activities and is marketing its products under the brand name COCOFRIENDS, and is ready to fulfil customized orders. The group initiated the process for registering their group as a nano/micro enterprise. A catalogue of some of their products is available for reference. #### IRD Model 15- Bhutan's Gross National Happiness Story

#### A Journey towards Happiness beyond Monetary Measures

Bhutan's development story is unlike that of any other country. In the early 1970s, His Majesty Jigme Singye Wangchuck, the Fourth King of Bhutan, introduced the concept of Gross National Happiness (GNH) as a gentle but powerful reminder that a nation's progress cannot be measured by economic growth alone. Even as a young monarch, he questioned the idea that Gross Domestic Product could fully represent the well-being of people. His vision was inspired by Bhutan's ancient legal code of 1629, which stated that if a government cannot create happiness for its people, it has no reason to exist. This principle, rooted in compassion and Bhutan's Buddhist values, laid the foundation for a development philosophy centred on people, community and harmony with nature.

GNH reflects Bhutan's belief that material prosperity must go hand in hand with spiritual, emotional and cultural well-being. Today, research around the world supports this idea, showing that income alone does not ensure life satisfaction. Bhutan has long understood that true progress means creating an environment where individuals and families can live

meaningful, balanced and fulfilling lives. This is why GNH has become more than an ideal; it is now a practical framework that guides the country's policies and development goals.

When Bhutan transformed into a democratic nation in 2008, it preserved the spirit of GNH within its Constitution. This commitment ensures that happiness is not just a guiding principle but an enduring national priority. Today, GNH is defined as a multidimensional approach to development that seeks a harmonious balance between material well-being and the cultural, emotional and spiritual needs of society. Its four pillars—Good Governance, Sustainable Socio-economic Development, Preservation and Promotion of Culture, and Environmental Conservation—capture the key elements needed for a thriving and resilient society.

These pillars are further expanded into nine domains, which illustrate how different aspects of life contribute to happiness. They include living standards, education, health, environment, community vitality, time use, psychological well-being, good governance and cultural resilience. By focusing on these interconnected domains, Bhutan recognises that happiness depends on more than wealth. It is shaped by our relationships, our environment, our cultural identity and the time we have for rest, family and personal growth.

Bhutan's approach continues to inspire global discussions on what it truly means to develop. At a time when many countries seek new ways to balance economic progress with human well-being, Gross National Happiness offers a refreshing and meaningful alternative. It shows that development can be compassionate, sustainable and deeply rooted in the values that make life worth living.

#### **CIRDAP - Voice of Rural Communities**

The Centre on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the Pacific (CIRDAP) is an Intergovernmental, Regional, and Autonomous organization. It was established on 6 July 1979 at the initiative of the countries of the Asia-Pacific region and the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations with support from several other UN bodies and donors. The Centre came into being to meet the felt needs of the developing countries at that time as an institution for promoting Integrated Rural Development in the region.

The United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) declared the date of 6 July as the World Rural Development Day, which is also the foundation day of Centre on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the pacific (CIRDAP), as a recognition of the organizations significant role in sustainable rural development endeavors in its member states in the Asia-Pacific region. The World Rural Development Day will be celebrated every 6 July as to inform and to remind everyone on his/her role and responsibility for collaborative actions on integrated rural development to meet the Sustainable Development Goals.

From the original six members, CIRDAP has now grown up as a Centre of 15 member countries. The member-countries are Afghanistan, Bangladesh (Host Country), Fiji, India, Indonesia, IR Iran, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, Nepal, Pakistan, Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Vietnam.

#### The main objectives of CIRDAP are to:

- Assist National Action;
- Promote Regional Cooperation;
- and Act as a servicing institution for its member countries for promotion: Integrated Rural Development (IRD) through Research, Action Research, Pilot Project, Training, and Information Dissemination. Amelioration of Rural Poverty in the Asia-Pacific region has been the prime concern of CIRDAP.

#### The programme priorities of CIRDAP are set under four Areas of Concern:

- Agrarian Development;
- Institutional/Infrastructural;
- Resource development, including human resources;
- Employment.

Within these Areas of Concern, the thematic areas identified are: Poverty alleviation through participatory approaches with emphasis on social sector development (e.g. Health, Education and Nutrition); Employment generation through Microcredit support, Infrastructure Development and Local resource mobilisation; Gender issues; Governance issues; and Environmental concerns for Sustainable Rural Development.

Operating through designated Contact Ministries and Link Institutions in member countries, CIRDAP promotes Technical Cooperation among nations of the region. It plays a supplementary and reinforcing role in supporting and furthering the effectiveness of Integrated Rural Development Programmes in the Asia-Pacific region.
