Dear Partners, Wish you all Happy New Year

The year 2025 stands out as a landmark year for CIRDAP, marked by global recognition, expanded partnerships, and impactful programmes across Member Countries. CIRDAP successfully organized the 40th Technical Committee Meeting in Yangon, Myanmar, with participation from all Member Countries. The meeting approved programmes and the budget for 2026–27 and recommended enhanced contributions, reaffirming strong collective support for CIRDAP's work.

In a historic development, The United Nations General Assembly officially recognized 6th July, the foundation day of CIRDAP, as World Rural Development Day to be celebrated annually. This international recognition underscores the vital contributions of CIRDAP to sustainable rural development in the Asia-Pacific region and beyond. CIRDAP celebrated the

first event with a theme “Integrated, Inclusive, sustainable and Enterprising Rural Development” and the message echoed in member countries specially Myanmar, India and Fiji through impactful celebrations.

All planned training programmes were completed on time, along with two additional self-financed trainings on SMEs and Startups in India and Thailand. In-house capacity building was strengthened through faculty training and a programme on the Application of Artificial Intelligence in the Workplace. The CIRDAP Knowledge Circuit was launched, with events already held in Myanmar and India.

CIRDAP's webinar series continued to grow, engaging nearly 1,000 professionals, with speakers from the USA, Taiwan, Kenya, and Pacific Island countries. The webinars were attended by around one thousand professionals representing member countries. CIRDAP research on Gender Responsive Budgeting in Nepal and Livelihood Promotion among Transgender Communities in India received strong stakeholder interest. Major publications on Integrated Rural Development, Agri-Food Systems, Climate Resilience, Entrepreneurship, Food and Nutrition Security, and Rural Tourism reached over 1.2 lakh stakeholders across Member Countries.

The CIRDAP Project Facilitation Centre was operationalized, receiving eight project proposals worth USD 4.8 million. The CIRDAP-REEDS Rural Innovation Challenge 2026 was launched to identify and promote high-impact rural innovations.

Gender mainstreaming has always been the priority of CIRDAP. International Women Day and World Rural Women day were celebrated by involving 30 inspiring women from member countries. We got the great opportunity to listen to their successful journey. The same were circulated through social media too.

107 renowned experts from different parts of the world were empanelled as CIRDAP Experts who are extended family of CIRDAP. About 32 reputed organisations in CIRDAP member countries serving rural communities have partnered with CIRDAP to reach more rural population jointly.

Social media has been effectively used to disseminate useful rural development content regularly reaching 1.2 Million viewers. CIRDAP is in the process of extending its service area by approaching 40 other Asia and Pacific countries to accept the CIRDAP membership and the response is encouraging.

Let us continue to work towards Integrated, Inclusive, Sustainable and Enterprising Rural Development.

Call for CIRDAP Research Proposals 2026: Towards Vibrant, Prosperous and Happy Rural Communities

CIRDAP is pleased to announce a Call for Proposals for Research Projects 2026 under the theme “Towards Vibrant, Prosperous and Happy Rural Communities.” This initiative reaffirms CIRDAP’s commitment to promoting inclusive and sustainable rural development through evidence-based research and knowledge sharing.

The call invites innovative and policy-relevant proposals from CIRDAP Experts, MoU Partners, Link Institutions, Academic and Research Organizations, Civil Society Groups, and Government Agencies across CIRDAP Member Countries. Priority areas include Community-driven development, Rural entrepreneurship, Youth engagement, Gender empowerment, Climate resilience, and innovations in rural service delivery.

Two projects will be selected for 2026, each receiving USD 6,000 in financial support along with technical guidance from the CIRDAP Secretariat. The research should be completed within one year, culminating in a publishable report or case study to enrich regional policy dialogue.

The discussion focused on enhancing cooperation and exploring opportunities to strengthen partnerships between CIRDAP and Bhutan in the field of integrated rural development.

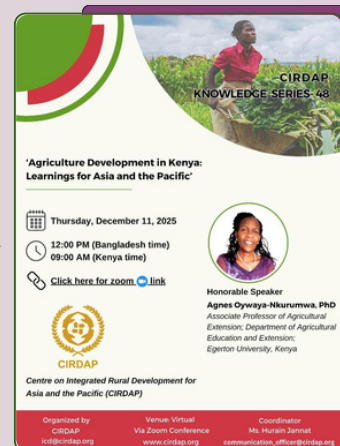

Kenya's Digital Evolution: Key Insights Shared at CIRDAP Knowledge Series Webinar

CIRDAP successfully hosted the Knowledge Series 48 – Webinar on “Agriculture Development in Kenya: Learnings for Asia and the Pacific” on 11 December 2025.

The session highlighted how Kenya's digital-led transformation is reshaping its agricultural landscape and offering practical lessons for countries across the Asia-Pacific region.

The webinar was presented by Dr. Agnes Oywaya-Nkurumwa, Associate Professor of Agricultural Extension at Egerton University, Kenya. She shared how Kenya's Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda is driving a shift from traditional agricultural practices toward a dynamic Digital Ecosystem, strengthened Climate Resilience, and Smart Market Access.



Key insights included:

- The rise of mobile-based platforms that connect farmers to finance, advisory services, and digital records.
- The use of satellite data to provide timely insurance support to pastoral communities.
- Modern logistics systems that link farmers directly to markets, reducing post-harvest losses and creating opportunities for women and youth.

The webinar was attended by His Excellency Dr. P. Chandra Shekara, Director General of CIRDAP, along with experts and participants from CIRDAP Member Countries, including a high number of representatives from Myanmar.

Global Best Practices in Agricultural Cooperatives: DG CIRDAP participation at International Workshop in New Delhi, India

The Director General of the Centre on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the Pacific, His Excellency Dr. P. Chandra Shekara, participated as a panelist in the International Workshop on “Best Practices in Agricultural Cooperatives in the Global Arena: Empowering Cooperatives in India for Sustainable Economic Growth and Rural Transformation,” held during 15–16 December 2025 at the National Academy of Agricultural Sciences Complex, New Delhi, India.

The international workshop was jointly organized by the National Academy of Agricultural Sciences and the Indian Council of Agricultural Research in the context of the United Nations declaring 2025 as the International Year of Cooperatives under the theme “Cooperatives Build a Better World.”



During the workshop, Dr. P. Chandra Shekara made a presentation on sharing best practices in agricultural cooperatives from cooperatives across CIRDAP Member Countries. His presentation highlighted successful experiences, lessons learned, and innovative cooperative models that contribute to sustainable economic growth and rural transformation.

The workshop provided a valuable platform for leaders of agricultural cooperatives from India and the global community to exchange knowledge on leadership, governance, management, and sustainability of cooperatives, while strengthening international collaboration in the cooperative sector. The programme was also attended by six co-operative leaders from Philippines, India, Nepal and Sri Lanka, representing CIRDAP Member Countries.

“Action Lab for Inclusive Livelihoods: Advancing Transgender and Gender-Variant Youth Integration through Apparel Training”

CIRDAP and NIRDPR, India, have joined hands on an action research initiative titled “Action Lab for the Inclusion of Transgender and Gender-Variant Youth in Mainstream Livelihood.” This pioneering project is designed to establish sustainable livelihood models for transgender and gender-diverse youth, ensuring their rightful inclusion in the mainstream economy. The Action Lab aims to:

- Collaborate with national initiatives and institutions to combat multidimensional poverty among transgender communities.
- Promote action-oriented research and develop inclusive policy frameworks.
- Provide technical support to livelihood programs and implement collaborative interventions.
- Document best practices and share knowledge widely to bridge gaps in skills, employment, resilient livelihoods, and entrepreneurial leadership.



➔ Apparel Stitching Training: Action Lab-2



As part of this initiative, Action Lab-2, the NIRDPR, in collaboration with PLEQSUS India Foundation, and supported by USHA International, conducted a training programme on 'Apparel Stitching' from November 12 to 26, 2025 at Baruipur, West Bengal. 15 transgender individuals were trained during this 15-day training programme. USHA International, which had an MoU with NIRDPR for this initiative, provided a professional trainer and 15 stitching machines (14 sewing machines and 1 interlock machine) worth INR 85,000 under its CSR activity. During the training, participants mastered stitching skills, including the Six-cut saya (petticoat), boys' school uniforms (shirts and pleated half - pants), girls' kameez, and strong, reusable cloth tote bags. By the end of the program, participants stood tall with pride – able to stitch their own clothes, create garments for loved ones, and envision dignified livelihoods. The transformation was profound: from fear to confidence, doubt to determination, helplessness to hope.



➔ Emerging Leaders

Out of the 15 trainees, five have emerged as strong performers with the potential to mentor others or become Master Trainers. Building on this success, NIRDPR is planning Phase 2 advanced training for these trainees, a 10-day program that focuses on high-end garment stitching, clearing doubts, and executing job orders.

This initiative is more than skill-building—it is about restoring dignity, fostering independence, and creating pathways to resilient livelihoods for India's transgender and gender-diverse communities.

CIRDAP and BARD Collaborative Leadership Training Programme for Strengthening Rural Cooperatives

IRDAP, in collaboration with the Bangladesh Academy for Rural Development (BARD), Kotbari, Cumilla, inaugurated the Leadership Development Training Programme for Strengthening Rural Cooperatives from 28 to 30 December 2025. The programme is designed to enhance the leadership capacities of rural cooperative leaders and promote sustainable socio-economic development in rural areas through effective cooperative models.



The inaugural session was graced by His Excellency Dr. P. Chandra Shekara, Director General of CIRDAP, and Mr. Saif Uddin Ahmed, Director General of BARD. Distinguished officials, including the Director of Training at BARD, representatives from local government institutions, and resource persons with extensive experience in rural development, were present to share their knowledge and insights. The training programme was attended by 40 participants, including chairpersons and functionaries of Agricultural Cooperatives in Bangladesh mentored by BARD.

This three-day programme aims to empower local cooperative leaders by providing them with practical knowledge on leadership, management, and governance of rural cooperatives. The participants will engage in interactive sessions, field visits, and action research activities based on the renowned Comilla Approach, which emphasizes participatory rural development and community-driven initiatives.





By strengthening rural cooperatives, the programme seeks to promote inclusive growth, reduce poverty, and create sustainable livelihoods across Bangladesh. The initiative reflects the shared commitment of CIRDAP and BARD to build capacity in rural development, foster innovation in cooperative management, and support policy advocacy for the upliftment of

rural communities under the guidance of the Ministry of Local Government, Rural Development, and Cooperatives. Through this programme, CIRDAP continues its mission to advance integrated rural development in the Asia-Pacific region by building the skills and leadership of individuals who are pivotal in transforming rural economies and communities.



IRD Model 16 - From Household Knowledge to Community Enterprise: Creating Livelihoods Through Value-Added Seafood Products in Myanmar

In the Ayeyarwady Region of Myanmar, Daw Han Thi, a housewife in her late fifties, has become a shining example of how rural women can transform local knowledge into sustainable livelihood opportunities. Living with her husband, her daughter's family, and her granddaughter, she had long wished to contribute more actively to the household income.

Her journey began in October 2024 when she attended a training on post-harvest management and hygienic seafood processing, organized by the Food and Agriculture Organization and Kyal Sin May, a local organization. The training exposed her to a variety of value-added seafood products, including dried fish, fish paste, and fish crackers. Among these, fish crackers emerged as a viable business opportunity, as they were widely consumed in her village but were always purchased from outside.



Recognizing the potential, Daw Han Thi launched her own micro-enterprise within a month, producing fish crackers from her family's daily fish catch. Operating from her home kitchen, she sold the products during village gatherings, in local schools, and door-to-door within her community. Priced affordably, her fish crackers were quickly embraced by children and adults alike, who appreciated the freshness, taste, and the fact that the snacks were now locally produced.

The enterprise rapidly became a reliable source of additional income, generating four thousand to six thousand Myanmar Kyats per sale, significantly supplementing earnings from

selling raw fish. Encouraged by her success, her daughter joined the production, and the community supported the venture through repeat purchases and word-of-mouth promotion.

Beyond personal gain, Daw Han Thi has actively shared her skills with other women in the village, fostering knowledge transfer and promoting small-scale entrepreneurship. With plans to introduce new flavors such as pumpkin and shrimp crackers, she envisions expanding her enterprise further, creating more opportunities for community development.

Daw Han Thi's story demonstrates how integrated rural development can be achieved through technical training, local resource utilization, and community engagement. It highlights the transformative role of women as economic agents and illustrates a replicable model for promoting inclusive rural livelihoods in Myanmar and beyond.



CIRDAP, in partnership with the Rural Economic and Educational Development Society (REEDS), has officially launched the India regional edition of the International Rural Development Innovation Challenge 2026 in Hyderabad, India on 22 December 2025.

Anchored on the theme “One Innovation. Endless Change. Countless Smiles.”, the initiative

aims to identify, recognize, and promote proven rural innovations that have created measurable impact at the grassroots level and show strong potential for scale and replication across Asia and the Pacific.

The event brought together policymakers, development practitioners, academicians, and civil society leaders working in the rural development ecosystem.

The programme was honored by the presence of Honorable Minister Dr. Anasuya Seethakka for Panchayati Raj and Rural Development and Honorable Member of Legislative Assembly of Bellampalli Shri G. Vinod of Government of Telangana, India, Dr. G. Narendra Kumar, IAS, Director General of the National Institute of Rural Development and Panchayati Raj, attended as Chief Guest, along with Dr. P. Chandra Shekara, Director General of CIRDAP and Mr. M. Ravindra Vikram, Chairman of the Rural Economic and Educational Development Society.

The Innovation Challenge will be supported by an international compendium of selected innovations and an International Conference proposed to be held in Sri Lanka in June 2026. The programme concluded with an open house discussion and media interaction, followed by a vote of thanks delivered by Dr. Ravi K. Reddy, Secretary of the Rural Economic and Educational Development Society.

The International Rural Development Innovation Challenge 2026 invites practitioners, institutions, entrepreneurs, researchers, development professionals, and grassroots innovators to participate and showcase impactful rural innovations with the potential for wider replication.

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The Centre on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the Pacific (CIRDAP) is an Intergovernmental, Regional, and Autonomous organization. It was established on 6 July 1979 at the initiative of the countries of the Asia-Pacific region and the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations with support from several other UN bodies and donors. The Centre came into being to meet the felt needs of the developing countries at that time as an institution for promoting Integrated Rural Development in the region.

The United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) declared the date of 6 July as the World Rural Development Day, which is also the foundation day of Centre on Integrated Rural Development for Asia and the Pacific (CIRDAP), as a recognition of the organizations significant role in sustainable rural development endeavors in its member states in the Asia-Pacific region. The World Rural Development Day will be celebrated every 6 July as to inform and to remind everyone on his/her role and responsibility for collaborative actions on integrated rural development to meet the Sustainable Development Goals.

From the original six members, CIRDAP has now grown up as a Centre of 15 member countries. The member-countries are Afghanistan, Bangladesh (Host Country), Fiji, India, Indonesia, IR Iran, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, Nepal, Pakistan, Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Vietnam.

The main objectives of CIRDAP are to:

- Assist National Action;
- Promote Regional Cooperation;
- and Act as a servicing institution for its member countries for promotion: Integrated Rural Development (IRD) through Research, Action Research, Pilot Project, Training, and Information Dissemination. Amelioration of Rural Poverty in the Asia-Pacific region has been the prime concern of CIRDAP.
